HOME CARE INSTRUCTIONS FOLLOWING PROSTATE ARTERY EMBOLIZATION 703-763-5224

WHAT TO EXPECT:

- You may have an increase in urine output initially following the procedure.
- > You may experience increased urinary frequency, mild pelvic pressure or discomfort, bloody urine, and/or painful urination for the next 7-14 days.
- You may experience, upon resuming sexual intercourse, blood in the semen for 7-21 days.
- > You may experience pressure, pain, or the urge to have a bowel movement when urinating for the next 4-7 days or notice a small amount of blood in the stool.
- ➤ Please call if you develop a fever (temp >101.5 degrees F), urinary retention or no relief from antiinflammatory medication. It is normal to have a low grade fever (<101.5) for 4-7 days.
- > You may have some tenderness and/or bruising around the puncture site initially. Perform activities that are within your comfort level. This should gradually resolve.
- After being discharged, if you notice a moderate amount of <u>new (bright red) blood or increased pain or swelling at the puncture site</u>, you should do the following: lay down, place your fingers on the groin, slightly above the puncture site, and hold firm pressure for 15 minutes. Stop activity at this time and keep the leg straight. If you are unable to stop the bleeding with firm pressure applied at the puncture site, call 911.
- If you notice slight oozing of blood at the puncture site, apply pressure, reinforce with small dressing or band-aid, and decrease activity level for several hours. If this fails, call the Interventional Radiology Dept at the phone number listed above.

DIET:

- > Drink plenty of fluids over the next 24 hours, unless instructed that your condition requires specific fluid restriction. (Note: this helps to flush the x-ray contrast out of your kidneys)
- > Avoid alcoholic beverages for 24 hours following your procedure.
- > Resume your regular diet.

ACTIVITY:

- Avoid strenuous activity, such as climbing long flights of stairs, for 24 hours after your procedure. No heavy lifting (greater than 10-20 lbs) for the next week or until the puncture site heels.
- > Do not drive a car, and keep walking at a minimum for 2 days following your procedure.
- > Avoid sitting in a bathtub or pool of water for 5 days following your procedure.

WOUND CARE:

Remove the dressing on your puncture site the next day, and then change a band-aid daily, for the next three days, until the site heals. Prior to applying a new band-aid, gently clean the site with soap and water, then dry the area thoroughly.

- > Do not apply powders or lotions to the puncture site for the next 5 days.
- > Keep the site clean and dry to prevent infection. If the band-aid becomes wet, replace it with a dry one.
- > Call the Interventional Radiology Dept. if redness, increasing tenderness/pain, or swelling/enlarging hard lump occurs at the puncture site.

MEDICATION:

- > Resume all previous medications. [EXCEPTION: If taking Glucophage (Metformin), hold for two days following the procedure.
- You have been provided the following prescriptions:
 - Ciprofloxacin-500mg twice a day for 5 days (to prevent infection)
 - o If you are not taking Ciprofloxacin, then follow instructions for alternate antibiotic
 - Motrin (Advil/Ibuprofen)-600mg three times a day for 4 days (anti-inflammatory)
 - Pyridium-200mg three time a day for 2 days (to alleviate bladder spasms and painful urination after the procedure) *Note: This medication will turn your urine orange for several days. Also, if you wear contact lenses, please do not use them while taking this medication, as it can stain them.
 - o Medrol Dose Pack to reduce inflammation and take as prescribed
